## DEATH OF WELL KNOWN CITIZEN

### Robert Caughell Falls A Victim to Pneumonia

Word received Saturday evening, of the death of Robert Caughell, brought surprise and sadness to many, who had not learned of his illness or known of its seriousness. Mr. Caughell and Seth Haley had gone on a business trip to O'Neil, Nebraska. The weather was bad and they suffered a good deal from the cold and dampness, and on their return to the Bluffs, Mr. Caughell went directly to the hospital. He was found to be suffering from the flu, which later developed into pneumonia. Friday evening he grew worse and his family was sent for. He passed away at 4:45 Saturday evening.

Robert Caughell was born near Henderson, April 27, 1883. He came to this locality about fifteen years ago and on November 16, 1908 he was married to Miss Della Smith, who with three children, Floyd, Katherine and Clara, are left to mourn his loss. Their home has been in the Spring Creek neighborhood, where they have a large farm, on which they lived 'til a year or so ago, when they came to Carson.

In addition to his farm, he was an active insurance worker and had won a good measure of success in that calling.

Beside his wife and children he is survived by three brothers, George and Edward of this place, and Henry, now of Hallowell, Kan., and three sisters, Mrs. J. R. Terrell, now of Lamar, Colo., Mrs. Ben Yeager of Woodbine and Mrs. Ed Hamaker, of Gage, Okla. One brother, Will, died three years ago.

He was a man of energy and activity and had many friends who regret his sudden call from his work here, while the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community goes out to the bereaved wife and little children. The remains reached Carson Monday morning, and were met by a delegation of members of the Masonic Lodge, of which he was long a member. The funeral was under the direction of that fraternity and interment was made in the Carson Cemetery.

Brief services were held at the home by Rev. E. R. Stroud, of the Methodist Church while the Masonic services at the cemetery were conducted by District Lecturer, Frank W. Perry, of Quick.
